SVSA MEMBER CASE STUDY

A newly established Community Interest Company approached us for assistance with developing policies, project planning, completing safeguarding training, and securing funding. Their aim was to deliver a diverse range of activities over a 12-month period to boost physical activity, mental health, diversity, and community cohesion, all through the rich tapestry of Indian culture.

Challenges

1. **Lack of Funding:** The company required £20,000 for their planned activities but had not yet secured any funding.
2. **Absence of a Project Plan:** Without a structured project plan, there was a risk of failing to obtain funding and manage the project effectively.
3. **Undefined Job Roles:** The lack of job descriptions for project staff created uncertainty around responsibilities, increasing the likelihood of overlooked tasks.
4. **No Safeguarding Training/Policies/Procedures:** The absence of safeguarding training, policies, and procedures meant the organisation could not adequately protect beneficiaries or ensure a safe environment.
5. **Inadequate Impact Measurement:** Without a system to capture data and measure impact, assessing the project's success and effectiveness was challenging.

Interventions and Solutions

Over six months, we implemented a comprehensive support plan:

1. **Funding Success:** Completed 4 funding bids totalling £28,820, and securing £20,000 to support a variety of activities over the next 12 months.
2. **Project Planning:** Developed a robust project plan to guide the effective implementation and management of activities.
3. **Role Descriptions:** Created detailed job descriptions and person specifications for project staff, clarifying responsibilities and aiding in the recruitment of suitable candidates.
4. **Safeguarding Training/Policies/Procedures:** Provided essential safeguarding training and developed necessary policies and procedures, equipping staff to protect vulnerable individuals and ensure a safe environment.
5. **Implementing Evaluation:** Established tailored evaluation methods to measure the effectiveness and impact of the project on beneficiaries.

Outcome

With our support, the Community Interest Company successfully secured the necessary funding, established clear operational frameworks, and implemented their planned activities effectively. This foundation enabled them to deliver an impactful project that met their goals of enhancing physical activity, mental health, diversity, and community cohesion through the celebration of Indian culture.

FUNDING NEWS

FUNDRAISING FROM TRUSTS: CHALLENGES, SUCCESS RATES, AND EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES

At SVSA, we recognise the current funding environment is extremely challenging, and many of our VCSE organisations are facing increased difficulty in securing grants from trusts and foundations. The report below offers insights to help organisations refine their strategies and improve their chances of obtaining funding.

LarkOwl Study on Trust Fundraising Success Rates

Overview:

LarkOwl, specialists in helping non-profits become more sustainable, conducted a study on the success rates of trust fundraising. Engaging in conversations about trust fundraising success rates, specifically, the number of applications required to secure funding, is crucial. Many leaders are often surprised by the sheer volume of applications necessary to achieve success. While trust fundraising remains cost-effective, it has become increasingly competitive in recent years.

Current Challenges:

Charities face unprecedented demand due to:

- Years of austerity measures
- Reduction in local authority budgets
- The Covid-19 pandemic
- The disruptive mini budget of autumn 2022, which destabilised markets and increased mortgage costs
- An ongoing cost-of-living crisis

Fundraising Realities:

Understanding that success rates from trusts and foundations may be lower than anticipated emphasises the importance of adhering to best practices, such as:

- Conducting comprehensive research to assess and qualify potential funders
- Identifying and demonstrating the need for the work being delivered
- Prioritising the quality of applications over quantity
- Maintaining regular, focused attention on trust fundraising efforts
- Committing to relationship building and networking

Benchmarking Data:

In our benchmarking studies, we collected data on individual fundraisers' success rates.

2019 Insights:

- The average trust fundraising success rate was 1 in 7 applications (30 respondents).
- Success rates varied from 1 in 12 for cold approaches to 1 in 3 for established relationships.

2021 Insights:

- Of the 26 charities that responded:
- The average success rate was 2 in 5 applications (40%).

However:

- 57% were charities with an annual turnover of £1m or more.
- 76% had employed a professional fundraiser for at least three years, with many having fundraisers for over ten years.
- Two-thirds were eligible for emergency Covid-19 funding.
- Reported success rates ranged significantly, from a 100% hit rate to fewer than 1 in 10 applications for five charities.

Application Volumes:

- The average number of applications submitted over a three-month period was 30.
- Charities with lower success rates often submitted significantly fewer applications.

Conclusions:

- **Volume Matters:** Trust fundraising is largely a numbers game; more applications generally increase success rates.
- **Larger Charities Perform Better:** Success rates are typically higher for larger charities, possibly due to their established track record and brand awareness.
- **Long-Term Commitment Pays Off:** Success rates improve with ongoing effort and dedication to trust fundraising, highlighting the value of a persistent and strategic approach.

How is SVSA supporting the sector in addressing challenges related to fundraising from trusts?

- **Hosting Virtual Funding Information Sessions:** These sessions allow you to quickly determine if a funder is suitable for your needs, providing an opportunity to ask specific questions about potential projects and offering direct access to the funder.
- **Arranging Funding Surgeries:** These surgeries offer the chance to meet and build relationships with potential funders.
- **Funding Support:** Our Funding Officer provides one-on-one support to help identify potential funders and offers guidance and assistance with bid writing.
- **Running Funding Searches:** We conduct funding searches to better identify potential funders that align with your needs.
- **Governance Support:** We assist VCSE organisations with governance to enhance their likelihood of securing funding.
- **Training:** We provide training to upskill VCSE organisations, enhancing their chances of securing funding.

APPLYING FOR FUNDING -IMPACT - SETTING OUTPUTS, OUTCOMES AND MILESTONES

Outcomes, Outputs and Milestones are all things you might be asked to discuss when applying for funding and also to report back on in evaluations. They can be easy to mix up and it can sometimes be difficult to think of what types of things to include. Here is a quick guide with examples, followed by links to more in depth explanations.

Outputs

Outputs are created by the work you are carrying out. They happen immediately as a result of whatever it is you are doing. They are usually tangible and easy to measure. They don't tell us how well something has been done, just that it was done.

Example

The project – starting a youth club

A youth club was started at the church. It runs every Tuesday and is attended by 25 young people.

Outputs

- 46 youth club sessions were delivered in 2023/24
- 25 young people attended most sessions
- 45 different young people attended over the course of the year

Measuring outputs is nearly always by 'counting something'. In the above example, its number of youth club sessions and number of young people through the door.

Others measures and providing 'proof'

Only some Funders will actually want to view 'the proof' but that doesn't mean you shouldn't methodically collect it and keep it . You should keep your documents until you have submitted your monitoring and evaluation and they have been accepted by the funder as sufficient and the grant is marked as complete. However, you should definitely keep your 'outputs, outcomes' and evaluation documents to use as impact evidence when you submit other funding bids (more of that later.)

Some of the easiest ways to collect 'proof' of your outputs is to keep paper or computer based records. In the case of the new youth club, you would probably have a 'weekly sign in sheet'. You can then count how many people turned up each week. If you have a paper based system you could just photograph the 'sign in sheet' , rather than copying the information in to a database.

Other measures of social welfare/community activities might be:

- Number of people who agree to take a blood pressure test at a 'pop up' cardiac health stall
- Number of social media posts
- Number of people who turned up to the AGM of the Community Centre

Outcomes

Outcomes are the reason you carry out the piece of work; they record a change (hopefully positive) which makes doing the activity all worthwhile. They usually need a little more thought to be able to measure them. They look at what happened later, as a result of a programme of activities. They may involve descriptions of 'feelings', 'improved knowledge or skill', 'changes in behaviour', 'changes in attitude'. The description may involve discussing 'effectiveness, efficiency or efficacy'. There may be a numerical element to the description.

Example

When the Tuesday night youth club was set up, it was in response to parents and teachers concerns that some teenagers spent all evening alone in their rooms, rarely socialised out school and had few friends. The aim was to create an environment which teenagers could meet similar young people, socialise with encouragement from youth workers and make friends. So we need to know that after eg 6 months whether 'there had been a change in behaviour'. From the outputs we know that 25 young people were going to the youth club. But the outcomes we would like to measure involve finding out 'the effectiveness' of the youth club model as a way to get young people to socialise and make new friends. We actually want to know whether they mixed at the youth club, whether they had conversations (or sat next to each other in front of a video game!) and whether they made friends.

Possible measures:

Before and After surveys

These can be quite simple pop quizzes about 'what you do on an evening', 'how often do you arrange to meet a peer outside of school'. There is also plenty of 'wheel charts' and more in depth questionnaires available online or you can make your own up. However you must ask your beneficiaries (the people that the activity is delivered to help) to fill out a 'before survey' before or soon after the programme starts and after a set period of time.

- Photographs – annotated
- Videos – showing the outcome or interviewing people
- Case Studies – which detail what you did and how it positively affected a service user

NATIONAL LOTTERY COMMUNITY FUND MAKES SOME CHANGES TO ITS UK FUND

Created last summer, the UK Fund has been a significant commitment to the National Lottery Community Fund (NLCF) new strategy 'It Starts with Community' which aims to tackle social issues facing UK communities.

In its first year, the UK Fund focused on supporting communities to connect in ways that better fit changing lives.

A year on, NLCF is increasing the focus and investment in creating lasting change for children and young people as part of its community-led mission to support communities to help children and young people thrive.

Grants of between **£500,000 and £5 million** are available for not-for-profit projects that run for **2 to 10 years**.

The funding is intended to increase the impact of what is already being done.

Projects need to:

- Benefit communities across the UK (by working in different locations, or by sharing learning between countries).
- Scale up their impact by expanding their work (by helping more people, or doing more for people they already work with).
- Support people experiencing poverty, disadvantage, and discrimination.
- Help make significant changes to services or systems that affect people's everyday lives.

Projects must also meet at least one of the following aims:

- Improve relationships between people with different life experiences.
- Help people and communities who find it difficult to meet face-to-face to make meaningful connections online.
- Help people from all backgrounds to influence the future of their communities.
- Help children and young people facing specific challenges change the systems that affect them.
- Help more organisations to involve and listen to children and young people.

THE FOYLE FOUNDATION TO END ITS GRANTS GIVING PROGRAMME - REMINDER

The Foyle Foundation has announced that after 25 years, it will end its Grants Giving Programme in 2025.

The Foundation currently awards funding in the Arts, Learning, Community, School Libraries and Health. Arts and learning charities can apply for grants through the Main Grants Scheme. This can include major building projects. Small charities can apply for grants of between £2,000 and £10,000 via the Small Grants Scheme, and state-funded schools can apply for grants of between £2,000 and £10,000 through the Foyle School Library Scheme.
